EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In 2024, Let's Save the Strays International (LSTSI) treated over 5,200 animals through targeted, community-led TNVR across our international project sites.

In Myanmar, we reached a milestone with 4,000+ animals sterilized and vaccinated, expanded operations in Yangon, and strengthened our team through education and veterinary mentorship.

In Thailand, monthly TNVR continued in Chiang Mai alongside urgent flood relief in Mae Taeng.

In Russia, 900 dogs were treated through consistent outreach. Our Philippines program concluded with one final round of TNVR and a lasting local impact.

Fueled by volunteers and donors, LSTSI continues to invest where need and impact are greatest—saving lives, training local leaders, and building a more humane future.





REFLECTING ON 2024: A YEAR OF GROWTH, RELIEF, AND RENEWAL

In 2024, Let's Save the Strays International (LSTSI) marked its most impactful year yet. With over 5,200 animals sterilized and vaccinated across our global project sites, we continued to show that progressive, community-led TNVR

is not only possible—but powerful. Despite the winding down of some programs, this year was defined by strategic focus, compassionate emergency response, and deep investment in local teams and future veterinary leaders.





GLOBAL HIGHLIGHTS

In 2024, Let's Save the Strays International reached more communities, treated more animals, and deepened its commitment to locally led solutions. From Myanmar to Russia, our impact continues to grow—one dog, one veterinarian, and one community at a time.

PROJECT REVIEW





MYANMAR: EXPANDING IMPACT

Over 4,000 animals treated: Our highest annual total in Myanmar, driven by expanded efforts in both Mandalay and Yangon.

Yangon project scaled up: The Yangon team now treats over 350 dogs per month—one of the largest urban stray populations in the country.

Team growth: Our Myanmar staff now includes 9 veterinarians, 6 technicians, 3 assistants, 40 volunteers, and 65 Animal Care Guardians.

Advanced training: New team members began formal instruction through Worldwide Veterinary Services in Chiang Mai.

Veterinary mentorship: Over 8 students were mentored into surgical roles through our growing collaboration with the local veterinary school.

Education initiative launched: A new program began in 2024 to promote rabies awareness, humane treatment, and the value of sterilization.





THAILAND: TNVR + EMERGENCY RELIEF



In **Mae Taeng, Chiang Mai**, LSTSI continued monthly TNVR operations in partnership with local veterinarians and the nonprofit *Hand to Paw*, treating between **50 and 85 dogs each month**. This work addresses one of Northern Thailand's most underserved regions, where overpopulation and limited veterinary resources remain serious challenges.

In **October 2024**, when severe floods devastated the Mae Taeng area, we responded immediately—delivering **thousands of dollars in emergency veterinary care, food, and supplies** to support affected families and their animals. This relief effort was rooted in the same community where our TNVR work is ongoing, underscoring our commitment to long-term, compassionate engagement.



RUSSIA: EXPANDED MONTHLY TNVR

In **Tula, Russia**, LSTSI treated **900 dogs in 2024** through consistent, monthly TNVR operations. Working street by street, our team continues to bring compassionate care to an area that once had no formal support for stray animals. These sustained efforts have not only improved **animal welfare**, but also enhanced community safety, establishing a humane, replicable model for managing stray populations in the region.

In 2024, LSTSI closed the year with a deficit of just over \$18,000. This reflects our decision to invest funds raised in late 2023 into **urgent, life-saving work** early in the year.

Rather than holding funds, we prioritized immediate action—**expanding TNVR operations, training new teams, and responding to emergencies.**

This strategic spending allowed us to increase our impact at a critical time. We view this not as a setback, but as an **investment in growth**. With continued donor support, we are on track to recover this gap in early 2025 and sustain our momentum.



LOOKING AHEAD

As we enter 2025, Let's Save the Strays International will focus on:

- Scaling **Yangon's TNVR and education programs**
- Strengthening our **mentorship pipeline** for veterinary students in Myanmar
- Continuing **monthly outreach and treatment in Chiang Mai**
- Maintaining **high-impact TNVR operations in Russia**
- Responding compassionately to **crisis situations** where animals and their communities need us most
